REGIONALIZATION: EFFECTIVE MINISTRY IN EVERY CULTURE

Regionalization allows United Methodists throughout our connection to best serve their unique communities as they share the love of God, make disciples and transform the world.



WHAT IS REGIONALIZATION?

- Regionalization allows each region of the church to make decisions that will best support outreach and ministry efforts in their specific setting. This ability is already in place in the central conferences; regionalization will bring that ability to the U.S. as well.
- Regionalization was developed collaboratively by United Methodists across the globe.
- It was adopted by an overwhelming majority of General Conference delegates.
- Nine regional conferences will comprise The UMC: one in the U.S. and eight in Africa, Europe and the Philippines.

WHAT CAN'T Regional conferences do?

- Create their own constitution or adopt any policy in violation of the constitution contained in the General Book of Discipline
- Alter The Doctrinal Standards, Our Theological Task, The Ministry of All Christians or The Social Principles

WHAT CAN Regional conferences do?

- Draft and publish their own regional Book of Discipline, hymnals, books of worship and other liturgical resources
- Set requirements for ordination and licensed ministry with respect to their needs and resources
- Set standards for lay membership
- Develop practices around marriage ceremonies, funerals and other rites that align with cultural contexts and laws in each country
- Reorganize their annual conferences, districts or charge conferences to best serve their missional needs and convene their own judicial courts
- Work with annual conferences to ensure policies and practices align with the laws in each country





WHAT NOW?

- The regionalization plan will require amending the United Methodist Constitution. Constitutional amendments must be passed by at least 2/3 of General Conference, which already happened.
- Now, the amendments must be ratified by annual conferences. Amendments must be supported by 2/3 of the total voting members of all the annual conferences combined this process could last until 2026.
- The Council of Bishops will announce when the amendments have met the threshold to become church law.

We have been blessed with shared leadership, deepened relationships, and the transformative power of working together for the kindom of God.

Ministry Highlights 2024–2025:

- Bishop's Day in the District: The privilege of hosting Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton was a highlight for our parish. It was a day of connection, vision, and renewal, strengthening our commitment to one another and to the mission of the Church.
- Joint Lenten Services: We came together during the season of Lent, beginning with a reflective Ash Wednesday service hosted by Hauppauge UMC and continuing through Maundy Thursday at the Commack UMC and Good Friday at the Smithtown UMC. These shared services fostered a deeper sense of unity, reminding us of the power of communal worship and the bonds we share in Christ.

In that way we will be more focused on the way we minister to the larger community, care for one another, and support the work of each church.

East End Cooperative Parish

The pastors and congregations of the East End parish continued to explore ways to grow together in Christ and serve our 10 communities. Pastor Tracy Moore and Rev. Joanne Utley serve as co-coordinators. The 10 churches and the pastors who serve them are East Hampton First and Hampton Bays: Kenny McQuiller, East Moriches and Center Moriches: Tracy Moore, Riverhead: Phil Hardt, Hamptons: Joanne Utley, North Fork: Ken Bohler, Westhampton and East Quogue: Samuel Jaesam Lee, Beach: East End Parish. Highlights of our past year include

- Care of Beach UMC: We have strived to help Beach UMC transition from their 16 years served by their beloved Pastor Jack King and powerhouse wife/ministry partner Joyce to being served without a dedicated pastor but rather by the entire coop. They have done remarkably well, stepping up to take on many new responsibilities and maintaining their missional orientation within the community. We are very proud of this congregation! We have some other plans in the works for this congregation as well.
- Sag Harbor UMC: We have brought some life back to this church which was standing idle by holding several events there including an all parish retreat in October, a Christmas concert with Christian artist Dave Pettigrew in December, and some youth group meetings. We look forward to more in the coming year.
- Pastor Ken and Pastor Tracy, assisted by Hampton Bays member, Audrey Pasierb have offered confirmation classes to the parish again this year with 4 youth from 3 different churches participating.
- Ongoing is youth fellowship with director Rob Soria. Meetings are offered weekly with worship, Bible study and fun as well as frequent off site events. Young people from 3 of our churches participate regularly but the reach is extended as a good number of youth from around the parish join for special events. Pastor Kenny McQuiller and Pastor Tracy Moore join in the fun and nurture as well.
- Several of our pastors and a number of committed laity offer protestant worship on Tuesdays for the residents of Westhampton Care Center. Among them are Pat Chuppe, Kenny McQuiller and Tracy Moore. The "congregation" there is as large as some of our regular congregations. They are extremely grateful but I believe those coming in from outside the center are equally if not more blessed by these services.
- The Seven Last Words of Christ was offered to the Riverhead community as well as our parish by Rev. Phil Hardt on Good Friday.
- The clergy gather for monthly lunches rotating churches, for sharing prayer and devotions, parish planning and fellowship.

We are most grateful to the lay speakers and retired clergy who help us cover our pulpits as we rotate to serve our parish congregation, Beach UMC. We look forward to continuing to serve the communities of the east end of Long Island and sharing the good news of Jesus Christ here as we grow together in the coming year. May it be so!

Since our parish is large, we divided it into two small groups of nine churches. The first group consists of four churches on the North Shore: Port Washington, Sea Cliff, Bayville, and New Dream. The second group is composed of five churches: Farmingdale, Hicksville, New York Plainview, Westbury, and Risen Rock Korean.

We are truly blessed to have two dedicated lay coordinators, Sheila Fontana (Sea Cliff) and Angela Pratt-Barrett (Westbury), who play a pivotal role in our parish. Their unwavering passion and faith have led them to actively engage in ministry and service alongside the pastors and other laity, enriching our community with their blessings.

Despite our differences, we have come together to develop a shared ministry, which has allowed us to get to know each other and work towards unity. We have been meeting every two months via Zoom to discuss the areas of ministry we can start. This worship experience helped us to heal, harmonize, and find joy, as well as gave us a deeper vision to interact and share our unique heritages and cultures in Christ. Many special thanks to Rev. North Shore Suffolk Cooperative Parish

The North Shore Suffolk Cooperative Parish continues to learn the ropes of cooperative



parishes and stretch the envelope. Located on the north shore of LI and straddling the Nassau-Suffolk county line, our cooperative parish consists of Centerport UMC, Dix Hills UMC, St. Paul's UMC (Northport), Union UMC (East Northport), West Hills UMC, Huntington-Cold Spring Harbor UMC, and Woodbury UMC. Our cooperative parish clergy meet on the first Tuesday mornings of each month, and our cooperative parish council meets on the first Tuesday evenings with the leadership of Linda Hees and David Czeisel as cooperative parish coordinators.

We have a lot of successes to share. Once again, we had great representation at the District Mission Walk and Picnic last May as we worked for our various mission goals. We also expanded our sandwich-making efforts for the Tri-CYA youth agency in Huntington's summer program from four weeks to seven this year. It was wonderful to provide lunches for these children, who may have gone hungry all day without the program. Come September, we continued our tradition of having a cooperative parish picnic, which was hosted by Union UMC.

But the neat thing about our cooperative parish is how people feel free to attend one another's events and ministries, intentionally mixing things up. For example, members from our churches help out with the Agape Garden at Dix Hills UMC, help to staff the thrift shop at St. Paul's UMC, volunteer to help unload pumpkins at Union UMC and assist the Restless Souls Haunted House at West Hills UMC. This year, we created a cooperative parish brochure of adult small groups to encourage people to find a study that is right for them and fits their schedule.

Hosted by our cooperative parish, Dinner Church takes place at St. Paul's UMC every 2nd and 4th Wednesday from 5:15-6:45 pm, and two churches from beyond the parish have come to experience it and bring it back to their own churches. Last May, we hosted a Dinner Church that honored local educators, which was a big success. Russ Jenkins has been a huge help this year in volunteering his time to cook, which has kept down expenses and the food has truly been amazing. Larry Sprinkle also preached several times at Dinner Church this year, and adults and children who attend find this style of participatory worship engaging.

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North Shore Suffolk Cooperative Parish, continued

As in previous years, our cooperative parish met for Lenten services every Wednesday at noon, rotating churches and encouraging lay servants to preach. Soup and sandwiches were shared after each weekly service. In addition, our congregations observed Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday together. All of our Holy Week and Easter services were publicized on a combined flyer.



Our cooperative parish also ran the Alpha Course for the third time at Café Portofino on Main Street in Northport. As in the past, the participants wanted to continue meeting together, so this time, we have begun meeting together weekly to discuss some of the questions that they are generating themselves.

Last year, our NSSCP Maundy Thursday service featured a combined choir, which was so well-received that it led us to put together a NSSCP Musical Celebration on February 2nd from 2-5 pm at St. Paul's UMC. About a hundred participants gathered to hear amateur and professional Christian musicians offer praise around the theme, "The Joy of the Lord is your strength!" (Nehemiah 8:10) Amanda Whaley, conducted the combined choir with Joe Ferrante as the accompanist, and Joe Ferrante also worked with some of the soloists. We were amazed at the glory of God and at the talents of so many musicians in our midst!



In 2024 our parish organized a combined Administrative Assistants' luncheon, where staff from across the parish were able to meet and network with each other. The event was so well-received that they requested that the clergy join them for this year's event!

South Shore Cooperative Parish

The South Shore Cooperative Parish has grown stronger over the past year. We continue to operate with a western branch (First Amityville, Babylon, Bay Shore, and Islip) and an eastern branch (Sayville, Bayport, Patchogue, and Bellport), but we now also have one South Shore parish council, with both branches coming together for regular meetings.

Some highlights from the year include:

- The seven clergy of the parish have worked together to provide pastoral, administrative, and worship support for Bayport UMC, after Bayport's pastor Seijn Cha transitioned to military chaplaincy as of August 2024.
- We provided the potluck meal for DS Hanse's installation.
- The western branch churches took turns hosting bimonthly midweek worship services and had some youth events together.
- Western and eastern branch churches each had shared worship services for Ash Wednesday, Holy Week, and Easter sunrise.
- Laity and clergy from the entire parish contributed to a Lenten devotional booklet, which our churches have found to be a rich faith resource.
- We also had a movie outing to see "King of Kings" during Holy Week.
- We were invited to join the first cohort of the NYAC Thriving Cooperative Parish Initiative. We attended an orientation in January and have begun the process of working with the first group of consultants, Partners for Sacred Places, to develop a property mission statement.

I. Mission Statement:

Our focus this year was on formulating a mission statement. As of 1/14/25, the following Definition, Mission and Vision were approved by our Cooperative Parish Council.

- **Definition:** The Southwest End/County Line Cooperative Parish is a blend of 7 churches with their pastors who, with God's help, actively seek to build up the body of Christ through outreach, missions, prayer and service to God and our communities. We are welcoming churches to all peoples.
- **Mission:** To strengthen our congregations, as the body of Christ so that our transformation will spark global change. To gain this effect, we will pool our gifts and resources to create synergies, consolidate for efficiency and amplify our collective ministries, ensuring God's grace is awake in our neighborhood thereby transforming this broken world!
- **Vision:** A unified body of United Methodists, unencumbered by distractions of financial stress and building maintenance, focused on worshiping and engaging in ministries together that expand our outreach in our communities.

II. Joint Worship Services:

Two joint worship services were held in Fall 2024:

 A special prayer service "Creating Change Together" on October 29th at Community UMC in Massapequa. Prayers, readings, scriptures, and responsive reflections on world peace and social justice were shared by pastors and members of all churches in our parish. A display board and handouts were created with information about the United Methodist Church's emphasis on social justice, civil responsibility and engagement in public life as part of our Christian ethics.

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Southwestern End/County Line Cooperative Parish, continued

 A joint Thanksgiving Worship Service on Tuesday, November 26th, at Bellmore UMC. Attendees were invited to bring canned goods to donate to Grace UMC's food pantry. Malcolm Hall from Bellmore UMC planned the service and delivered the sermon. The anthem "Thank You, Jesus" was performed by a joint parish choir anthem. The service was well attended, and we were blessed with inspiring music and messages.

In Spring 2025, the following joint worship services were held:

- During Lent, we had joint weekly worship services and fellowship on Wednesday nights, that rotated locations among the churches. Most of the services started with a light dinner at 6 pm, followed by a worship service at 7 pm. Our parish Lenten study program was "The Sanctuary for Lent 2025" authored by Justin LaRosa.
- On Good Friday, a joint worship service was held at Bellmore UMC. The service included an interactive, dramatic presentation that enabled the congregation to reflect upon the crucifixion and picture themselves being present on that occasion. Malcolm Hall delivered the message.

III. Joint Outreach Ministry

Our parish generously supported the New Hour Prison Ministry with donations of gifts for families at Christmas and donations of toiletries for incarcerated women who are re-entering society during Lent. Offering from our joint Lenten worship services will go towards funding summer camp at Quinipet for children of New Hour.

IV. Joint Fellowship

A cooperative parish group bus trip to Lancaster, PA is planned for May 7-9. The trip will include transportation, 2 nights lodging, meals, admission to the show "NOAH" at the Sight and Sound Theatre, admission to a show at the Magic and Wonder Theater, plus visits to The Amish Experience and other local Lancaster sights.

V. Joint Prayer

In our SWE/CL Cooperative Parish prayer, we seek divine guidance in discerning ways to organize, unify and present God's message of grace to the world. We pray for a breakthrough that will show us a new way to experience revival as seven congregations brought together with one mission to serve and glorify God's name in our Long Island community.

Our intentional focus on laity empowerment made this year's Lenten journey a transformational experience. In each Wednesday service, the laity planned, led, and preached, while the clergy stepped back to support—only preaching on Good Friday.

The result? An overwhelming excitement and engagement among lay members. They rose to the occasion with joy and boldness, proving once again that every member is a minister. Their feedback was very encouraging. As a result of the corporate experience, the following exciting decisions have been made:

- i. We will continue to gather bi-monthly as Western End Corporate Parish, once every two months, to worship together as a cooperative parish. The first gathering will occur on 4th June 2025 at Hempstead United Methodist Church.
- ii. We have agreed to hold a picnic together this summer. A committee has been chosen to investigate and bring us a report on where to go for the picnic together at our next meeting in May.
- iii. We have agreed to investigate the possibilities of doing periodic Bible Studies together.
- iv. Advocate for Local Preaching School for Spanish Local Preachers, alongside the English."

Laity Leadership Development

In response to the enthusiasm of our lay members, we elected a Laity Leadership Team to help guide and mobilize the lay voice across the Parish. These individuals will support coordination, communication, and involvement in future initiatives.

Regular Meetings and Fellowship

Our Cooperative Parish meets monthly on the third Monday, providing a space for connection, planning, and prayer. We only paused our March meeting this year due to the weekly Lenten services, but the rhythm of our gatherings has helped keep us aligned and inspired.

Final Word: The Road Ahead

The Western End Cooperative Parish is no longer just a structure, it is becoming a movement. A movement of shared worship, mutual support, and Spirit-led growth. We believe that the Lord has only just begun a good work among us, and we press forward with hope, unity, and purpose.

- The following is a summary of some of the ministry areas, the Co-Lay Leaders and Laity Leadership Team of the LIE District participated in during the past annual conference year:
- Co-Lay Leaders, as members of the Superintendency Committee, gather via teleconference with other members and the District Superintendent, for weekly prayer on Wednesday mornings to pray for the needs of the district, the conference and the world. District Co-Lay Leaders, as members of the Superintendency committee, assisted in the planning and presentation of a beautiful Installation Service for DS Hanse, at Babylon UMC, hosted by the South Shore Cooperative Parish.
- Laity in our district participated in leading worship on Laity Sunday in October as well as taking leadership roles in their various cooperative parishes.

- District Youth Ministries are active and expressing their faith in worship and in service to the community. The District Youth Retreat is scheduled for April 25-27 at Camp Quinipet.
- The District Mission Walk, which raises funds for church mission projects, will take place on May 10th at Belmont Lake State Park. Each church has a goal of \$200 and will use the money for the mission ministry of their choice. To raise the funds, they will take a walk around the park. Each church must register. The district provides wonderful music, delicious food and joyful fellowship.
- Cooperative Parish Councils are progressing at their own pace and unique makeup. This year, our Lay Servant Ministries Committee team finished their classes prior to Holy Week. Certificates will be emailed to each participant who completed the course as well as to their pastors so they can be celebrated in their churches. We will be planning classes for the spring, summer and fall this year, as we look forward to equipping many Lay Speakers this year. To date, we have had 153 registrations for classes with 49 being from out of district, and were blessed with one registration that was actually out of our conference. This committee also approved two Certified Lay Speakers, Fred Dymek and Kysten Ellison as well as approving two Certified Lay Ministers to advance to the district Committee on Ordained Ministry, Mary Czeisel and Kysten Ellison.

We continue to urge our clergy to continue encouraging members of your congregation to participate in the training and development opportunities offered by our Lay Servant Ministry Team. These courses are designed to strengthen the skills and spiritual gifts of laity so they can serve effectively in preaching, teaching, and other ministries. 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District Education Committee

Our District Education Committee radically changed its approach in how to educate and empower the people of the Long Island East District in the past year. Our previous model was focused on the **Disciple 2 Disciple (D2D)** workshop in January-February. Although recent experiments were made using a hybrid format since the pandemic, and efforts were made to consolidate from two locations to one, it was clear that we were not getting back to our pre-pandemic numbers, and presenters who had traveled long distances only found themselves with a few participants. In our best estimation, this was not due to the quality of the participants, as we often had at least a few, fabulous, well-known presenters!

Therefore, D2D was scaled way back this year to its essential function – providing training for members of the Finance, Trustees, and Staff-Pastor Parish Relations Committees. The trainings were held as early in the new year as possible and moved to a purely online format, in order to accommodate as many people as possible. All D2D webinars were held on Zoom from 4-5 pm:

LI East District Youth Council

One of the most unique things about our Long Island East District is its District Youth Council. Up until this year, we have been the *only* district to have a district youth council working with our young people for about a decade. Thankfully, the LI West District is now beginning to organize a youth council of its own, and the annual conference has created an ad hoc team called Young People's Ministries to work with children, youth, and young adults. The hope in the latter is that, by considering the entire young portion of a person's life, we can create programming that mentors a person in Christian discipleship from childhood through young adulthood.

Having the only district youth council that survived the pandemic meant that our district youth council has had an active role in providing leadership on the annual conference levels. We are also trying to serve as a point of contact for local churches and cooperative parishes, many of whom are starting their own ministry with young people, and may need some rallying points where the larger Church can provide organization and some critical mass. Churches don't need to have a weekly youth group to get started; they just need a couple of chaperones willing to take whatever youth they know to a district youth or annual conference youth gathering! Once they make friends, we believe they'll want to connect with other youth back home.

To this end, our District Youth Council organized the following events on the district level:

- Mission Walk & Picnic May 11, 2024 We provided our retreat band, and our youth council ran games for younger kids.
- * Trip to Splish Splash Waterpark August 2024
- Youth Council Meeting and visit to "Restless Souls" October 18, 2024 Our youth council met to plan upcoming activities, and stayed for the West Hills UMC's haunted house.
- UM Family Christmas Festival December 7, 2024 Our Youth Council organized a Christmas party for the children of the community at Babylon UMC, featuring approximately 50 people playing games, eating treats, singing songs, making crafts, having fun, and acting out a pop up pageant.

I share the individual church's efforts in sharing God's love by serving underprivileged neighbors and others. I appreciate their affectionate service for others every day! If we are together in the mission, we can do something more to deliver God's Love. It does not take much to serve our neighbors who need help.

The committee has encouraged serving neighbors who are facing difficulties in their lives, such as women and children experiencing homelessness and individuals with disabilities. NYPUMC (Rev. David Kang) at Plainview and FUMC (Rev. Clare Wu) at Farmingdale are on a mission for the second year. NYPUMC supports the Milal Disabled Association by providing a monthly meal and promoting fundraisers. Huntington UMC supplies sandwiches to neighbors.

Rev. David Czeisel (St. Paul UMC) maintains his passion for mission work with the youth group. He has a distinct report regarding the youth mission.

The collection of UMCOR kits for the flood-affected area has been very successful. Bayport UMC has more than 55 flood kits and 20 hygiene kits, while Hicksville has over 12 kits waiting to be delivered to the Central Hub in PA.

We also want to share plans to focus on and achieve goals in 2025 with our diligent Pastors and laity of the LIE District. I request your cooperation to ensure that the ministry can continue successfully.

The Mission Committee includes Rev. Barbara Whitlow, Rev. David Czeisel, Susan Dewey-Hammer, and Catarina Choi, who serves as the Mission Coordinator.

What we had achieved in 2024:

- Two HUBs will be available in the LIE District starting in 2025, one at Hicksville UMC (Rev. Iwy Patel-Yatri) for Nassau County and one at Bayport UMC (Margaret King) for Suffolk County. All the UMCOR kits are stored in these HUBs.

- 4. Plainview UMC: Visit a Disabled organization in Queens, serve them hot food, and support a fundraiser yearly. Also, serve hot food and gifts to the Bethany Women's Shelter.
- 5. The Monthly Zoom meeting continues.

What plans will be achieved in 2025?

- 1. Continue the monthly mission committee meeting, or as necessary, for an update.
- 2. Sharing each church's mission activity with the mission committee is encouraged to improve the effectiveness of the district mission.
- 3. Recruit more members for the mission committee.
- 4. Farmingdale and Plainview UMCs will continue the mission for our community.
- 5. Choose a district-level mission project that could support a Ukrainian missionary.
- 6. Form a fundraising team to accomplish the project.
- 7. Further discussion on homelessness in the LIE District is necessary.

c.)To keep the district superintendent advised concerning conditions within the district as they affect relations among the district superintendent, the laity, the clergy, and the district agencies.

d.)To establish a clearly understood process for observing the district superintendent's ministry with direct evaluation and feedback, with special concern for the inclusiveness of the Church and its ministry with respect to sex, race, and national origin, and implementation of the consultative process in appointment making.

e) To consult with the district superintendent concerning continuing education and to arrange with the Cabinet and bishop for the necessary time and financial assistance for the attendance of the district superintendent at such continuing education events as may serve his/her professional and spiritual growth.

f) To interpret to the people of the district and to the district boards and agencies the nature and function of the district superintendency.

District Treasurer's Report

Our district finances have become quite active in recent years. As the events in our district have grown, so too has the support that we provide. I would like to thank our district and annual conference staff for all of their assistance over the last 8 years in my time as district treasurer, and I am especially grateful for the patience of the district's laity and clergy. It has been an honor to serve you.

In addition to these funds, we are also blessed to have received parish development funding for youth ministry, anti-racism work and evangelism. While we did not receive another \$6,000 in each of these ministry areas this year, we still have some funding leftover from the previous grant cycle.

Our fiscal year runs from July to June, and this year our total budget is \$26,450 – exactly the same as last year's budget.
