### Greetings from the President

In that instance, they did not see that as disciples they had been given the power to heal the son, if only their faith had been at least as large as a mustard seed. I see some of our present-day disciples do not see that they have the power to serve in many different ways and make a difference not only with the children but with all of their brothers and sisters in these turbulent times everywhere.

So, as we move thru this Lenten season preparing ourselves for the time of Resurrection when Christ will come again, let us see ourselves as the resurrection for our neighborhoods, our schools, our children, our world. Remember we are disciples who have been empowered by The Holy Spirit to do the miracles here on earth while we wait for Resurrection Sunday to come again.

### **General Treasurer's Notes for Newsletter**

Please take the time now to review your unit's financial status. Although your yearly pledge may be received later in the year, if your unit wants to be recognized as a Five Star Unit for 2019, **all qualifying money must be received no later than September 15.** To qualify as a Five Star Unit, the local unit needs to send a remittance for each of the following categories:

**Pledge to Mission:** Each unit is urged to notify the District Treasurer of a pledge that it wishes to make to Mission. It is a portion of each unit's budget that is set as a goal to submit to the Women's Division through the District Treasurer.

**Special Mission Recognition:** An individual or your local unit honors a special person. Gifts can be in the following amounts: \$40, \$60, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1000 or \$2000. The recipient receives a lapel pin and a certificate. Details are in the UMW handbook. The pin and certificate are ordered through the District Treasurer. Delivery has been enhanced due to improvements in the on-line ordering system, but adequate time should be allowed for processing. Any Special Mission Recognition may be ordered with a certificate only for recipients who have several pins.

**Gift to Mission:** A gift of \$5 or more for mission is sent in honor of any person. A card may be sent by the donor (an individual or the local unit) to the honoree. These cards may be ordered from the District Treasurer. There are several card themes: For a New Baby, Congratulations, Peace, In the Service of Christ, A Special Day, Thank You, Thinking of You and Happy Birthday.

**Gift in Memory:** A gift (minimum of \$5) is made in memory of a member of the unit or a friend. Gift acknowledgement cards are available from the District Treasurer. They may also be ordered in packages of 10 from the Mission Resource Center. When a Gift in Memory is made, the Local Treasurer send the money, along with the "tear off portion" of the card to the District Treasurer and sends the card to the family of the deceased.

**World Thank Offering:** Individuals or families collect additional gifts in special boxes or containers (see Mission Resource Center catalog for appropriate resources). Gifts are brought together once a year, usually with a special service of thanksgiving. A service is printed each year in the Program Book.

### JOSEPHINE LEE GIBSON 1910-1976 WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE The Methodis: Church



Jo Gibson was a "light" of Trinity Methodist Church, White Plains, New York, for more than forty-five years. As a

choir member, chair of the Council on Ministries and much more, her life clearly exemplified that of leader, friend, and steward. Community involvement included the NAACP, Urban League of Westchester County, the Interfaith Council of White Plains, which she served as the first black president, and the Student Aid Society, which she served as president for over twenty-five years. A scholarship that helps deserving youngsters achieve a college education is awarded annually by the Student Aid Society in Jo Gibson's memory. Her love of the Methodist women's organization was evidenced through her activity and leadership in the Women's Society of Christian Service in both the Delaware and New York Conferences. She was the first black dean of the New York Conference School of Christian Mission. In recognition of her tircless and faithful service, the New York Conference established the Jo Gibson Scholarship, which annually gives financial assistance to women attending the School of Christian Mission. Truly it can be said of Jo Gibson. "She was a saint who in her modest and unostentatious way led the world in thought and usefulness. She is among the great of the earth."
